

WORLD BOOK DAY

We're really looking forward to celebrating World Book Day on **Thursday 6th March**. We would like to invite the children to come dressed as their favourite book character for the day. We know the children love to dress up on this special day, but don't worry too much about costumes: there are plenty of book characters who just wear normal clothes such as Percy Jackson, Lyra Belacqua and Danny the Champion of the World. The children have all been sent home with a £1 book voucher, which can be exchanged in our local bookshops for a book or can be put towards a more expensive book.

There will be lots of special activities on the day and the children will learn in mixed up teaching groups.

The librarians would also like to invite all the children to bring in a loo roll decorated to look

like their favourite character. You can be as creative as you like and there will be prizes for the best character in each class.





Our school community was saddened by the death of Garry Deeks, our former Chair of Governors, whose funeral was held on Monday 17th February. Garry was full of passion and selfless energy. He seemed to live his life for others and to be involved in every aspect of our community, including acting as a school governor at Fressingfield Primary School for many years. He was driven by a sense of social justice and fairness and, at school, a love of teaching. I remember him, as will many of our ex-students, as the man who taught us how to dance the maypole – how he managed to play the harmonica and give instructions at the same time was a minor miracle! He taught my class how to make wheeled land-sails and came again to help them design a polytunnel for the kitchen garden, which was eventually built (in true Garry Deeks style) using fencing posts and plastic piping. He also taught – as a volunteer - our 'Aiming High' group once a week, every week, for a number of years; he loved working with the children, and the children

loved working with him because he was always interesting, passionate and fun. As a governor, he knew how to be a critical friend – providing support and challenge in equal measure - and he brought a lifetime of experience to the role. I know that I and everyone at Fressingfield Primary School will

miss him.

A TRAUMA INFORMED SCHOOL



Through this week, all members of staff at Fressingfield Primary will be participating in whole-staff training delivered by Trauma Informed Schools UK. The aim of the training is to support our school to implement traumainformed and mentally-healthy practices. TISUK report that 'on average children wait 10 years to get help with a mental health problem' but that, 'many teachers feel de-skilled at working with a child with mental health issues.' It is certainly clear that mental-health issues amongst children are rising and that these can provide a barrier to successful learning and positive outcomes at school. The sessions will ensure our staff have the knowledge, skills and understanding to optimise the well-being of both the children and adults in our community. We are really pleased to be able to participate in this training, which sits so well alongside the THRIVE training all staff completed a little while ago. Ensuring our children feel valued, supported, ready to learn and happy is fundamental for all of us at Fressingfield Primary School.
